Sunday Worship – The Holy Eucharist

Has a pattern that is the same each week. The first part is the time when God's people are **COMING TOGETHER**.

Last week we looked at the first 5 parts. Next, we sit down and listen to the **Bible Lessons**.

The first reading we hear is from the OLD TESTAMENT, which usually has a story, a promise, or a warning. Today's reading is from Deuteronomy 4:1-2 & 6-9. (in your Bible or the Pew Sheet) and has a warning AND a promise.

God warns the people that they must not forget the things God has told them to do. God wants them to share them with their children and grandchildren, so that they will be wise and make good choices.
